Silver Linings at the Capuchin Soup Kitchen

Conner Kitchen, Earthworks Urban Farm & Rosa Parks Children & Youth Program Celebrate 25 Years of Service

The Rosa Parks Children and Youth Program, Earthworks, and our Conner soup kitchen location are commemorating 25 years

of ministry. The Capuchin Soup Kitchen prioritizes our guests' needs to nourish all who come to us. Our initiatives are influenced by the example set by St. Francis of Assisi, shaping our mission to stimulate intellectual growth, uplift spirits, and drive sustainable, impactful transformations. In celebrating our quarter century of service, we spoke with the Executive Director of Capuchin Soup Kitchen, Brother Gary Wegner, and Food Service and Hospitality Director Alison Costello.

Conner has established a strong presence in the community due to the commitment to keeping the doors open. Even during the initial stages of the COVID-19 pandemic, we continued to serve meals for takeout.

Brother Gary was crucial in ensuring the soup kitchens operated smoothly for lunch takeout. As restrictions eased, we gradually reintroduced dinner service. Brother Gary expresses gratitude for this decision, as he witnessed families filling up the dining room last summer. The demand for assistance remains high in Detroit.

When Alison initially arrived at the Conner Site, she identified several areas for improvement. A significant portion of the meals served were pre-packaged. Recognizing the health challenges faced by many patrons, such as childhood

Understanding our guests' preferences, she ensured that healthy dishes like asparagus were grilled to perfection, catering to their palates. Drawing from her extensive experience in food retail, Alison played a pivotal role in elevating the standards of our meal sites. She identified the lack of recycling practices, prompting a discussion with former Friar Rick Samyn, the founder of Earthworks. As a result, the Capuchin Soup Kitchen now recycles all waste from both sites.

Earthworks is an exceptional program that provides abundant fresh food for our Meldrum kitchen, enabling us to

offer our guests a delightful dining experience. While relying on pizza and French fries might be tempting, prioritizing nutritious meals is paramount.

Wendy Casey is the dedicated Earthworks Director. She and three other Earth workers employees have undergone comprehensive training through the program. Beyond its focus on growing food, Earthworks has cultivated a strong team, which Br. Gary commended.
